She wants to promote that anything is possible, if that's what you want to do.

One2One Support Volunteer Training

Our latest One2One support course took place towards the end of last year and we were delighted to sign off our latest batch of recruits who are now fully trained One2One support volunteers. We caught up with Andy and Lea, two of our latest recruits and asked them why they undertook the training and what they have personally gained from it.



LEA: I had my first lleostomy surgery in June 2022 and shortly afterwards I met an IA One2One volunteer. I remember thinking that I finally had someone to talk to who truly understood what I'd just gone through. When I had my second surgery due to complications One2One Support volunteer support was invaluable. She inspired me to become a volunteer myself as I wanted to be able to support people both pre- and post-op so they too could talk to someone that understood what they were going through.

ANDY: I have not had much luck with my health over the years and after a very serious bout of colitis in the late 90's, there was talk about surgery and having to have an ileostomy. At the time I found it quite a taboo subject and did not have anyone to talk to about life 'with a bag'. Whilst there were plenty of handouts and the stoma nurses I met were great - I just wanted to talk to someone who had been through it. Despite remission for over 10 years, the colitis returned alongside a bowel cancer diagnosis and so I needed surgery. I have always enjoyed talking to people and have been quite open about my various surgeries, treatments and experiences. When the opportunity arose to become a One2One support volunteer I thought it would be ideal for me to develop new skills and techniques to help others. I learned so much during the training, especially how to actively listen and I achieved a greater understanding of what it means to support people with any lifestyle questions or queries they may have about life with a stoma. It is such a rewarding role and the training I received has also helped me in my personal and working life.

Our training is undertaken online via zoom across a number of training modules in a group setting. Peer to peer support and encouragement in a group setting is so important and helps the attendees to practice with others, get feedback from the training team and develop their communication skills, which they use as a support volunteer, and in everyday life. The role of the One2One support volunteer can be a lifeline for many who are struggling to come to terms with the need for surgery, or who have had surgery and want to speak with someone who has been through something similar. A support volunteer is someone who will listen, empathise, understand their concerns and offer support and encouragement as required.
