### How would you describe the skin around your stoma?



With the increase in telephone consultations with stoma nurses, patients need to be able to describe the problem accurately. ASCN is putting together a Guideline on treatment of sore skin, and they would be interested in hearing from ostomates as to how they actually describe it. As part of the workshop at the Information Day we are requesting people send in photographs beforehand (which would be anonymised) and then 'described' in the workshop – in order to come up with a set of terms that would then be standardised for use by both patients and Healthcare Professionals.
